

1 pm: Cycling Britain on a Twenty Five Quid Bike by Nick Dawes: "Around 15 years ago I cycled LeJog with a pal, as lots of people do, but I was unfit, naively unprepared and riding an 'old school' Raleigh I bought cheaply off a pal. Then I wrote a book about it "

2 pm: The Unknown Story of Tommy Simpson and the 1958 Cardiff Empire and Commonwealth Games by Stuart Stanton:

"In all the work published on Simpson, there has been very little mention of this chapter and only a very few b/w photos ever published. These came from the archive of the late Ron Good and were bequeathed to me prior to his death. The story itself is very relevant with the Birmingham on the horizon."

5 pm: In Search of Lost Lanes by Jack Thurston:

Jack turned his lifelong love of exploring the British countryside by bike into a best-selling series of regional guidebooks. Jack's talk will focus on the enduring appeal of quiet country lanes and rural byways and he'll share his tips and tricks on how to design great routes and get the most from your days out exploring by bike. As presenter of the long-running *The Bike Show*, Jack was an early cycling podcaster, and has more recently anchored the *Slow Cycling* documentary series on GCN+.

6 pm: Cycle framebuilding by Richard Hallett

Having learned the finer points of custom frame building under the tutelage of legendary British builder Cliff Shrubb, Richard began building bike frames to put into practice some of the ideas and experience gained over more than two decades spent testing bikes and writing about cycling technology for the UK's leading cycling magazines.

This talk discusses technical aspects of the traditional framebuilding techniques of brazing, fillet-brazing and silver-soldering, exploring the difference between bi-laminate construction and conventional lugs, explaining how brazing makes strong joints and detailing the tube preparation required for a successful outcome.

Beryl Burton on the Greenway!

Anyone joining the 'Easy' ride to Riccall at 9:20am will be in for two special treats.

First, at the Methodist Hall in Riccall the local W. I. is kindly opening with a traditional spread of refreshments to delight any hungry cyclist.

Then on the return trip riders will pause to remember the great racing cyclist Beryl Burton, who opened the Greenway in 1987 as the very first section of the UK's National Cycle Network.

Her daughter Denise (pictured right in the child seat as Beryl rides) will say a few words as a new interpretation board is unveiled alongside the memorial plaque to Beryl which stands alongside the Greenway.





York area cycle route diversions - heads up!

Visitors to the York Rally should be aware of works and changes on major cycle routes in and near York.

First, Terry Avenue in York (the riverside path which runs from the Millennium Bridge towards the city centre on the side of the river closest to the Rally site) is closed for long term flood prevention work. This closure will definitely be in place during the Rally. For many destinations in town you can just use the other side of the river, and there are signed diversions too.

Secondly, the route north across Clifton Ings (on the NCN route to Beningborough

Hall) has been diverted to a new path but it's pretty close to the one one so should not cause significant issues.


Finally, and most seriously, the Sustrans NCN Route 65 from Selby to York, also known as the Solar System Greenway, (and part of the Trans-Pennine Trail) may be closed at a stretch including the critical river crossing near York. including the "Fisher of Dreams" former swing bridge between Bishopthorpe and Naburn.

We have been in close and friendly contact with Sustrans and they hope, but cannot

guarantee, that works will be complete by the Rally weekend and the path will be open. But we must be aware that it could be shut to all traffic, with heavy machinery on site and no possibility of access even for pedestrians.

If this section is still closed during the Rally, it could disrupt several of our led rides, and of course inconvenience Rallygoers arriving or departing from the Rally by this route.

Our proposed diversion route in case the bridge is closed is detailed below. This will be clearly signposted.





Brian's involvement in the York Rally started in approximately 1988 when fellow cycling club member Trevor Wheatcroft asked if he could help with pegging out and setting up the campsite. This was often in the rain, but Brian would be out there sporting his work boots, shorts and his bright yellow work-supplied waterproof coat.

He attended every year after until the Rally's cancellation due to Covid in 2020, with just one exception when he had some excuse of being on holiday in the USA to celebrate his & his wife Sandra's silver wedding anniversary, but the family was still represented as his daughter came and camped in her tent.

He helped with the campsite for many years until his health began to limit him a little, but he still helped out by moving stuff in his car round the site and becoming his daughter's (our treasurer's) chauffeur.

He also became our main programme sales person on the entrance gate in the last few years before Covid. He was known for his cheeky remarks including "Buy a programme, see what you missed!" to those leaving the site, and on Sunday just about persuading people to buy a second programme saying "This is the new updated version" when they had already bought one on the Saturday.

Brian lost his wife Sandra unexpectedly and suddenly in 2015 to cancer, but this didn't curb his enthusiasm for the Rally. He would be on site from Wednesday to help where he could with set-up, and otherwise he would often be found enjoying a chat and a coffee with fellow rally-goers and friends.

For many years until he retired from the AA, his carayan would sport an AA "Join here" sign. I don't think he ever did sign up any new members, but he often had to help out rally-goers by jump-starting vehicles where the battery had gone flat, or to get into cars when keys had got locked inside.

Brian died in July 2020 aged 72, after a short illness, leaving behind his two grown up children Karl and Rachel, who are both involved with the Rally.

IN GRATEFUL MEMORY

Brian and Pauline Witty

Sadly, two years ago, the York Rally lost two of its longest serving volunteers, Brian and Pauline Witty.

They had been supporting the Rally since its early days. Brian used to run the campsite but through his work on the committee also carried out many other tasks over the years. He was also a cycling rights campaigner which involved him with many local groups and forums with meetings up and down the country.

Pauline was famously known for her fat rascals and other sweet delights which she often baked for the volunteers at the Rally

along with serving gallons of tea and coffee.

They both used to camp at the Rally until later years when they stayed at a local B & B. They also took their family to the Rally where they often competed in events, winning the Cycling Family and the Bicycle Belle awards. Brian was awarded the CTC Honour Award for his contribution to cycling.

They both passed away peacefully within 6 months of each other after moving into a care home.

IN GRATEFUL MEMORY **Paul Hepworth**

Few can have contributed more time and energy in recent decades to the York Rally than Paul Hepworth. Alongside numerous other local volunteering commitments – to CTC North Yorkshire, to the York Cycle Campaign, to Holgate Windmill, to Poppleton Road Memorial Hall and in his indefatigable letter-writing to the York Press as 'Pedalling Paul' - the York Rally was very fortunate to benefit from Paul's dedicated service, and huge organisational prowess. Without Paul's tireless and selfless work, we might not even have a Rally now, such was the workload he undertook, as Chairman of the organising committee and in many other roles. Paul was also instrumental in the creation of the York to Riccall path along the old East Coast Main Line, now known as the Solar System Greenway.

But Paul was never one to seek the limelight, and it's perhaps telling of his modesty that the best photo we have shows him not centre stage, but pictured (left) with his camera, no doubt gathering images to promote the next York Rally, while accompanying the civic party as they watched the Grand Parade leave York Minster in 2007, in a glorious stream of cyclists.

Even after the new team of volunteers revived the Rally in 2015, Paul was hugely generous and helpful with ideas, contacts and assistance wherever he could, and he is much missed.

Paul passed away in March 2020 during a heart operation, leaving behind his wife and two sons.
